Friday, JULY 18 - A DAY WITH THE GLOBAL HAWK

The art and science of military aviation has changed a lot from what it was in the beginning. World War I saw Snoopy the Beagle battling The Red Baron who was flying his red tri-wing cloth-covered aeroplane. World War II saw our MBCA member Don Werner flying his P-38 propdriven airplane against the Axis. The Korean Conflict and the Vietnam Action saw another MBCA member John DuPriest flying jet-powered aircraft against new enemies.

Today, one of the very important aircraft flown by the United States Air Force is a jet-powered, unmanned craft called the Global Hawk. This is a fascinating aircraft. When it is deployed "on station" it is launched and landed by personnel who are right there where it is. However, when it is flying the main part of its mission, which can be more than 24 hours, it is controlled by personnel thousands of miles away at Beale Air Force Base, just south of Marysville.

The Global Hawk is a surveillance aircraft. Through its video capabilities it provides critical information to troops who are active in ground operations. For instance, one of the deadly devices used by the enemy in Iraq is the IED (Improvised Explosive Device). The Global Hawk can perform reconnaissance to see if the area along a route to be used by ground troops has been disturbed in such a way that would suggest IEDs have been planted.

On July 18 we will have opportunity to learn about the Global Hawk and other operations performed at Beale AFB. After a Unit Mission Briefing we will see the Global Hawk and the U-2 aircraft up-close, as well as visiting some other Beale facilities. After this we will have a buffet lunch at the Beale Consolidated Club. This will be an all-you-can-eat buffet for only \$10.

July 18 is a Friday, an unusual day for our Section to have an event. However, this is the only day of the week available for tours at Beale AFB. Another unusual aspect of this event is that security precautions have to be complied with. We will need personal information about each attendee so that a background check can be made. This is spelled out

A Visit To The CALFIRE Air Force

On May 10, members of the Sacramento Section visited the Aviation Management Unit Headquarters of CALFIRE (formerly the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection). Located at what was McClellan Air Force Base until a few years ago, this site serves as the operations and maintenance hub for the 13 Air Attack Bases placed strategically around California.


Their own air force consists of fortyeight planes from the Vietnam era – mainly the Grumman S2T, the Bell UH-1 helicopter, and the North American Rockwell OV-10. They developed an impressive FAA-approved service facility that does everything from tire changes to major airframe repairs.

All the planes were obtained from the military but they have been extensively modified for their fire-fighting role. The UH-1, or "Huey", got a more powerful engine from the Cobra attack helicopter, and a bigger rotor from the Bell 212. Since so much more torque (and lift capability) was available, they had to re-locate the tail rotor to the opposite side of the helicopter tail. The helicopter is used with a collapsible bucket on a cable that can use lakes (or swimming pools) for quick access to water.

The S2 was the Navy's anti submarine plane but in place of the torpedoes, a 1200-gallon fire retardant tank is placed in that bay. Our guide, Air Operations Officer Bill Mason, wanted to emphasize that fire retardants are usually used to control the direction of a fire and placed in front of the flames. They use two different kinds of retardant - and for really bad fires they have contracted for the services of a converted DC-10, which can carry up to 12,000 gallons of retardant.

Finally, the OV-10, used in Viet Nam in a FAC (Forward Air Control) role, is

Last October, with so many fires in Southern California, the FAA told the CDF that for about 3 or 4 days the CALFIRE Air Attack Base located at the Hemet airport – near San Bernardino – was the 2nd busiest airport in the United States because of all the firefighting aircraft activity.

The CDF has helped fight fires in neighboring states and even Mexico. They teach fire fighters from places as far as China on their aerial fire-fighting techniques.

Lunch was at the former Officer's Club – now Lions Gate Hotel and Conference Center.

I'd like to thank Tony Otis and his son Kevin (who works on the helicopters) for arranging the tour. Thanks also go to Air Operations Officer Bill Mason for his detailed and highly informative tour.

According to the *SL Market Letter* (<u>www.slmarket.com</u>), the value of good examples of the venerable 450SL,380SL and 560SL is on the upswing. Although this series was made far longer than any other SL and in far greater numbers, editor John Olson felt the good ones left are only about 20% of total production. Of the 237,287 made for all markets, 20% would now amount to 47,457 (worldwide).

This is still more than the total numbers of the "Pagoda" 280SL of 1968-1971 (23,885 made) or the 300SL coupe and roadster (3,259) but the shrinking supply of *nice* R107s is starting to drive up the price.

This reflects the experience of my neighbor and Club member Emma Rodrigues, who has had a rare tobacco brown 1981 380SL since its showroom debut at Von Housen Motors. She regularly gets parking lot inquiries from people wanting to buy the car...

How she got the car 27 years ago is a funny story but I will let her tell the story next time she's at an event....


